

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


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From the Dean

Buying Lessons

Late last year, my wife and I, along with a silent partner, purchased a 160-acre piece of land in Pickaway County, the county just south of Columbus. It's about 10 minutes from the office, private and secluded. In time, we will build a home there. For now, we are simply beginning the journey and adventure of new experiences, including registering ownership with the Farm Service Administration, and finding a farmer to farm it.

A new vocabulary has come into our understanding revolving around agriculture. Terms like 'farming on the halves', 'cash renter', 'waterways', 'bow season', '4 WD', '540 PTO', 'category 1 3-point hitch' & 'joystick valve' have new meaning and significance to us. Also, deciding whether a pick-up truck with a 6 ½ foot bed is big enough or whether we really need the 8 foot bed, and whether a 4- or 5-foot loader is big enough for the tractor are new considerations not previously pondered.

So, it came in February that it was time to purchase my first pick-up truck (hold the gun-rack). I used the internet to search for just the right truck by model, mileage, price, transmission, etc. Narrowing the pool to 4 trucks, I visited 4 dealerships on a Saturday. I felt a bit like Goldilocks: the first truck wouldn't release the emergency brake when I released the clutch for the test drive; the second truck was sold to someone else right after I test drove it; the third truck was a little pricey and noisy with its custom exhaust; and the fourth truck was just right.

I arrived at the fourth dealership at 4:30 pm with a closing time of 5:00 pm. When I asked if I could take it for a test drive, I was told that they had already locked the vehicles and really only let folks take them this late if they were serious about a vehicle. When I shared that I would not have driven 40 miles to see it if I wasn't serious, I got the test drive.

After my wife looked at the truck on Monday, we decided to buy. (The two magic words of a successful marriage are 'Yes, dear'. For both sexes.) We chose to finance the truck, so I called my banker, dropped by about 1 pm to sign the application (not fill out, simply sign) and was approved by 5 pm that afternoon.

This experience underscores three points that are good reminders for us:


- A web presence is necessary in today's competitive environment. While choosing an optometrist is far
 different from buying a used pick-up truck, a web presence can tell potential and existing patients much
 about you and allow them to differentiate you from your competition.
- 2. Don't close the shop before quitting time. Often, we and our staff are excited about what we are to do after the end of business. Often, I have seen the last hour of the day be the most productive financially. While it is the 'same stuff, different day' for us, it may be the first time for the patient or the only time in several years that they are visiting your office. Be there for them.
- 3. Keep offering service to your patients. I was very happy to not have to fill out a credit application at the bank. The bank staff did it for me. I appreciate that service. Many of your patients appreciate your service, too and are willing to pay for it. Provide them top-notch service.

We will be working on a web presence later this year, after doubling our space this spring. And the truck? It's a 1997 Ford F150 XLT 4WD long bed with towing package, about 85K miles. Now, on to a tractor.



It is not uncommon that family members of alumni are students in the College of Optometry. It is a little more uncommon to have two family members of an alumnus in the College at the same time. The Shaheens are such a family. Kelly Shaheen (OD'72) has been in practice in

his hometown of Canton since graduation and has been an influence in the decisions of his second cousin, Daniel Shaheen ('07) and his nephew, Michael Shaheen ('09) to pursue optometry as a career.



Kelly Shaheen (OD'72) and nephew Michael Shaheen ('09).


We visited with each of them and followed the students for a day to understand what a 'Day in the Life' of each is like. We then asked Dr Kelly Shaheen to recall his days in the College to offer a comparison across the decades. But first, we asked them all how they became interested in optometry.

Dr Shaheen has needed visual correction since the 6th grade and visited Dr. Harold Mylius as a youngster. Though Dr. Mylius used crutches, he had a great outlook on life, one that impressed his young patient.

Michael's journey began with having an optometrist as an uncle, with frequent visits to the office and being constantly fascinated by the various aspects of practice. Later, he worked in his uncle's practice and became increasingly interested in the profession.

Dan's path was more circuitous. He graduated from West Point in 1998, and completed flight training. He was medically retired in 2000 and selected optometry after discussions with Dr. Shaheen and his exposure to ocular anatomy/physiology and visual perception studies during the aeromedicine part of flight training.

Michael finds that his typical day of his first year in optometry includes classes, labs, and studying mostly. Like his uncle, he often studies in small groups, where students test one another to be sure of a concept. Dr. Shaheen found the first quarter to be the most challenging, just getting acclimated. Both found that social time, whether with classmates and their spouses, or family members, is important in maintaining life balance. While Dr. Shaheen found some free time for intramural baseball and football, Michael finds working out to be more his style. Michael has also been greatly impressed by the merit and stature of the faculty and his classmates. One notable change in curriculum is the physiology courses. While Michael takes that class with only his optometry classmates, Dr. Shaheen found himself taking physiol-

ogy with other graduate students, many of whom had a great understanding of physiology before entering the class.

Dan's day also involves classes and studying, but additionally, he has the responsibility of seeing patients solo in the Primary Care Clinic, and doing rotations in the Eyewear Gallery. He will miss out on what Dr. Shaheen fondly remembers as the "Eskridge oral exams" during the third year, when each student in Dr. Shaheen's class was subjected to an oral examination of anything they might have learned (or forgotten) in the first three years of optometry by former faculty member

Boyd Eskridge (MS'59, PhD'64).

Dan fills his small amounts of free

time with an occasional workout, like Michael.

For both students, a primary care private practice setting holds interest in the future. Dan sometimes contemplates working with military aviators in the Army's Aeromedical Department or with West Point Cadets. Michael has also entertained the possibility of doing research in the profession.

While the curriculum evolves over time, and the classes change, it is interesting to note how many elements of the optometry education experience are common even across the decades.

Optometry Runs in the Columbus Marathon

The College of Optometry had a strong showing this year at the Columbus Marathon run on October 16, 2005. This year a total of eight students and faculty competed in the event with dozens of members of our optometry family providing moral support along the way. Over the years the College has had several individuals finish high in the standings by running at well under 6-minute pace. This year we didn't have any of these special "speed-merchants," but we did have a fun-loving, dedicated group of runners that brought our college closer together.

First year student **Bret Lehman** (**'09**) finished his very first marathon in 3:24:02. Bret took this opportunity to raise money for two most worthwhile causes. "Last

August, I decided to run my first marathon and chose the 2005 Columbus Marathon to be the location. I wanted to raise money for each of the 26.2 miles. With the support of faculty, staff, and students in the College of Optometry, we raised \$840; donating half to SVOSH (Student Volunteers for Optometric Services to Humanity) and half to the American Red Cross for hurricane Katrina relief. This was enough to motivate me to finish under my goal of 3 hours and 30 minutes. I plan to run my next 26 miles at 26 years of age!"

Third year student Corrie Ziegler ('07) ran the full marathon in 2004, but found herself too busy with school and her OPT7 graduate work to train for the full marathon this year. She competed in the relay division and completed a ½ marathon. "Last year I ran the full Columbus marathon and this year I ran the half. Both began in the same way with me standing at the start line at 8:00am in 35 degree weather asking myself, 'Why the heck am I doing this?!' However, after seeing the faces of family, friends, and fellow optometry students in the crowd cheering you on and the natural 'rush' of running that last mile, the reason for running becomes clear."

Fourth year student Dan Perrine ('06) led the way for the optometry corps in his third Columbus Marathon. Dan qualified for the Boston Marathon with a time of 3:08:09, beating his previous best time by over 16 minutes. "The 2005 Columbus Marathon was my best experience yet as a runner. I would like to extend a special thanks to all of those in the OSU Optometry community who came out to cheer us on. It is wonderful to be in a profession where colleagues show so much support for one another."

Fourth year student Lucy Zgonc ('06) finished her 3rd complete marathon. "Running a marathon is truly an awesome experience, and I strongly encourage anyone who enjoys running to seriously consider training for one. The Columbus marathon was extra special this year since so many of 'us' participated. Even though we didn't all run as a group, it was pretty cool to know that we were all pulling for each other somewhere along the 26.2 mile path."

Faculty members Joe Barr (OD'77, MS'79), Carla Mack (OD'95), and Julie (Randles) Curtis (OD'03) trained

and competed together as each ran his/her first marathon. Constituting Team Fluffy, the group had several months of weekend long runs together preparing for the special day.

Julie Curtis: "Having the opportunity to train with Carla Mack and Joe Barr was a great experience. We were all first time marathoners, so the encouragement we provided each other during the tough training sessions really helped us to achieve our goals on race day."

Carla Mack: "The experience with 'my team' (Joe and Julie) was great. Started with a smile, lots of slow and steady, then finished with a smile."

Joe Barr: "Team Fluffy (Barr, Curtis and Mack) had a lot of laughs during the marathon, especially when I was telling people to hurry out of the portapotties on the near east side of town. Our goal was to finish, so time was not an issue. We were encouraged by our spouses, family, and friends. We sent them for more GU (because Julie didn't bring the picnic basket), but by the time they bought it we had been served at the corner of Ackerman and Kenny Roads. We were fortunate the weather was perfect for our first marathon. We look forward to our next one."

Veteran marathoner Greg Good (OD'75, MS'79,

PhD'81) finished his 26th marathon. "Although this was far from my fastest marathon, it was perhaps my most enjoyable. I think I have finally reached the point of running them purely for fun, trying to just enjoy the day. It was a perfect day weather-wise and the course was filled with many optometry well-wishers."

to the E.F. Wildermuth Foundation
Professorship in Optometry.

Dr. Joseph T. Barr is currently Professor of Optometry and Vision Science and Associate Dean for Clinical Services and Professional Program at The Ohio State University College of Optometry. His doctor of optometry degree, masters degree in physiological optics, and fellowship training in contact lenses and cornea were all earned at Ohio State.

From 1980 to 1983 he worked for Dow Corning Ophthalmics where he was the Director of Clinical and Materials Research. He is the Director of the Collaborative Longitudinal Evaluation of Keratoconus (CLEK) Photography Reading Center and a member of the CLEK Executive Committee. Dr. Barr is the Immediate Past-Chairman of the Section on Cornea and Contact Lenses of the American Academy of Optometry. He is the Editor of Contact Lens Spectrum and the founding editor of the CLToday weekly e-mail newsletter. He is a member of the American Optometric Association, International Society for Contact Lens Research, International Association of Contact Lens Educators, and the Association of Optometric Contact Lens Educators. He is the author or co-author of over 50 peer reviewed publications in the area of cornea and contact lenses.



Sheedy in the New York Times

Dr. James Sheedy(OD/MS'74,

PhD'77), has been the subject of several recent news stories from OSU Today to The New York Times. His new research on the condition of dry eye is what has garnered the recent media attention.

Dr. Sheedy's research suggests that squinting at a computer screen reduces the number of times an individual blinks, which in turn causes a person's eyes to ache or burn, with accompanying sensations of dryness such as irritation or tearing.

Practice Management Courses Made Permanent Part of Curriculum

It has been a long-term criticism by alumni and concern of the faculty: the curriculum does not include enough practice management courses. That concern has been addressed in a significant way over the last 5 + years by the Curriculum Committee under the leadership of **Dr. Paulette Schmidt** (**OD'73, MS'76**).

Collaboration among alumni, the Fisher College of Business at the Ohio State University, VSP Consultant Mr. William Bennett, and Mark Wright (OD'80), Daniel Runyan (BS'66, OD'69), Mark Bullimore (MCOptom, PhD), Kelly Nichols (OD, MS'98, PhD'00, MPH), Robert Newcomb (OD'71, MPH), and Joseph Barr (OD'77, MS'79) contributed to the plan. A series of pilot courses emphasizing aspects of practice management so critical to patient care in contemporary optometric practice, refinement of the content of the already existing courses, and ultimately, deciding where to place courses in the curriculum were all managed by the group.

In February 2006, a four-course series was formally adopted for permanent inclusion in the optometry curriculum. The series is as follows:

Optometry 420 - Optometric Career Options and Financing - 1st year – Goal setting, modes of optometric practice, and budgeting/debt management principles for achieving personal financial success while in school and after graduation.

Intructors: Dr. Mark Wright and Dr. Bill Rives from the OSU Fisher College of Business Optometry 422 - Financial Issues in Optometric Health Care - 1st year - Overview and history of managed care; Medicaid, Medicare, and other third-party payment plans; rules for documenting patient histories, examinations, and decision-making.

Instructor: Dr. Mark Wright

Optometry 423 - Coding and Reimbursement - 2nd year - ICD-9 and CPT coding procedures for vision and management/evaluation services; reimbursement issues related to fee schedules, insurance audits, and third-party billing.

Instructor: Dr. Mark Wright

Optometry 424 - Third-Party Payment Plans - 3rd year - Issues related to joining a third-party payment plan; integrating managed care into the optometric office; evaluation of managed care contracts.

Instructor: Dr. Mark Wright

For several years, these courses were piloted in the professional curriculum to refine course content, course placement, and relationship to other courses in the Professional Orientation Track. The other courses include:

Optometry 401 - Survey of Optometry

Instructor: Dr. Robert Newcomb

Optometry 402 – Rights and Responsibilities of Optometrists

*Instructor: Dr. Robert Newcomb**

Optometry 721 - Optometric Economics and Jurisprudence *Instructor: Dr. Daniel Runyan*

Optometry 722 –Public Health and Community Optometry *Instructor: Dr. Robert Newcomb*

With this series, all optometry students will have completed the academic practice management series by the end of their third professional year. This will allow students to use the concepts and apply them in their fourth year as they participate in off-campus extern experiences in all settings. In addition, Optometry 741 - Advanced Practical Optometry - Selected Issues Encountered in Contemporary Practice (4th year, 2 quarters), now includes the completion of a business plan for professional practice with in-class presentations to banking experts. And the Primary Care Extern Experience (4th year, 1 quarter) now includes business as well as clinical aspects of practice in real-world settings

Also, students will have these practice management tools early enough in their academic career to use them as they seek practice opportunities

Already the Office of Student Affairs has found the course series to be a useful tool in student recruitment.

Another exciting change is planned for implementation Summer Quarter 2006 with the addition of the third extern rotation to the fourth year. Students currently participate in two extern rotations (non campus-based): Ocular Disease and Primary Care Extern Experiences.
